The British sources mark as **Fort No. 2** a battery of guns (most probably 87/24 with strengthened barrel) on a hill (presumably Harapkalç) al Seddülbahir village between Fort Seddülbahir and a mortar battery (Fort No. 5) located at the village's NE end.

As **Fort No. 5** the British marked five field guns not mentioned in any Turkish nor German source. This name possibly concerns a battery of six 150/11.6 mortars located at the NE end of Seddülbahir village and destroyed by the Allied navy on February 26, 1915. The day after the same battery was blown up by Capt. Sandford's demolition party.

The name **Fort No. 23** in the British sources is related to a battery of six 210/6.4 mortars subordinate to Anadolu Mecidiye Fort (Fort No.24) and located between the fort and the Dardanelles Fortified Zone's main hospital.
